Black Widow

Simplicity In Motion

In 1957 Chevrolet came out with a stripped down Bel Aire with a fuel injected 283 straight out of a Corvette. The numbers were strictly limited and it came without carpet, or any modern amenities, just a big V-8, roll cage, and little else. Available only in black, they were popularly known as the Black Widow. It was probably the first factory hot rod, and was built to compete in Nascar racing. This was the inspiration behind the Black Widow by Vengeance Motorcycles. They took the same power plant and drive train that they package into their top-of-the-line bikes, and stuffed it into a no-frills, bare-bones, traditionally styled bike.

Vengeance Black Widow (below)

The Vengeance Black Widow is the hot rod of choppers. It features 60-spoke wire wheels and a peanut tank resulting in a classic old-school chopper look. The Black Widow comes standard with drag bars, a stock front fender and a drag-style rear fender. The frame features 40 degrees of rake with a stock backbone, 6 inches in the downtubes with a 10-inch-over front end. The 2005 Widow comes standard with a black 113-inch engine, a 6-speed transmission and a 250-series rear tire.
